I found the workload very do-able. That is why I chose to do more courses than what was asked of me. I had only one course for which I had to make an exam (arctic climate change). The rest where all essays, in groupwork or alone. Furthermore I had one "take home exam" with essay like questions.

The culture is very relaxed, the communication between students and teachers is very easy. The workload is lower and the students aim for lower grades than in Wageningen.

The cafeteria offers warm lunches for €2,60, which are very nice.
