2. Motivation for exchange

Why did you choose to go on study exchange?

I wanted to broaden my knowledge with an abroad experience. I heard so much great stories of people who went on an exchange before, that I became enthusiastic myself to go too. At first I was a bit scared too, going all by my self abroad for 5 months, but it brought me so many great things in life.

What is the reason you chose for this country/university?

I was inspired by a presentation of one of the other nutrition & health students on the minor market, which took place in my second year of studies. She went to UEF and her stories, and snowy pictures;) made my so curious to go there myself. Besides I heard it was a very popular university among BVG students, so I looked up the courses of UEF and this fitted my field of interest, so I applied.

3. Accessibility to reach destination

Do you have any tips to reach your exchange destination? (E.g. bus, train, etc.)

I went first to Helsinki by plane, this is a really nice connection and not that long (+/- 2h). After that I took the train (train company is called VR) to Kuopio of 4 hours and very a great connection too. From Kuopio railway station you can take busses anywhere you want but take the first time cash money! Another option is taking the plane from Helsinki Airport to Kuopio Airport, this only takes you 1 hour. However, from the airport no busses are going to the city center so you need an taxi.

How is the study formalized? (E.g. study forms, academic level, examination, workload, lesson material)

I experienced a different way of education than in Wageningen. It was a different way of scheduling and therefore less high work pressure most moments. So, the academic level is perfectly fine to handle if compared to Wageningen. Also, there were less in-person hours, but it was a lot online also because of Covid. With my courses I only had one exam from one course. The other courses had different (group) assignments during the course which in the end determined your grade.

What is the culture of the university? (E.g. How approachable are the lecturers, engagement with local students? What are the differences with the WUR?)

The biggest difference is the school lunches! In Finland they offer you healthy and tasty school lunches for 1.60 per meal, you can put as much as you want on your plate. This is really nice to get together with your fellow students and to have a talk and enjoy lunch between the study time.

Furthermore, the university has self-study rooms, a nice library and enough IT services. The Finnish students are not as approachable as the Dutch population I would say. They are really nice and willing to help you once you ask them, but they are in the first impression not as open for contact as the Dutch students are.

What does the university offer the student additionally? (E.g. Catering, sports facilities, laundry facilities?)

As mentioned above, the school lunches offered are very nice. Also, the university has a sports building on the campus, called Studentia, in which you can go to the gym and follow sports classes. This is around the 35 euros per semester for unlimited use. Besides, Studentia has free sauna turns during the week, also very very nice.

5. Housing-travelling-living

What are the possibilities for housing? (E.g. Availability to sign up for a room on campus, private rooms, rent rates?)

They have a housing service called Kuopas. These offer housing for especially exchange students and other people who need housing for a shorter time. You have the option to give preference for a rooms that fits you best. The rooms are really nice (about 14m2 I believe) and you pay around the 300 euros/month.

What is the culture of the country like? (E.g. Differences with home, local cuisine, habits, manners?)

There is not so much 'big' difference, except for the people who are really introvert. It is not usual that they say hi to you when passing each other on the street, or that you say hi to Finns you don't know. However, this does not mean that contact with them is impossible. As soon as you get to know them, they are really nice and they can be really good friends.

Could you give a general price indication of the place of residence compared to living in Wageningen?

Mentioned earlier, around 300 euros.

Could you give some information about public transport infrastructure? (E.g. Cost public transport card, taxi prices, how to travel to the university?)

From most Kuopas places you can go by bus to university. You can buy yourself a buscard and charge it each month of your stay, the amount is around 40 euros.

6. Free time

What are must-sees in the area? (E.g. nearby destinations, how do you prefer to travel, when to plan?)

National parks, Lapland, Tallinn, Stockholm, Tampere, Turku. I would say join ESN Kisa, they organize a lot of cool activities and trips for international students. This is a good way to explore the Finnish life and to get to know new people.

What does not appear in the travel guide, but is worth a visit?

As a mentioned before, join ESN Kisa, and you get to know very soon a lot of people with whom you can do a lot of fun stuff! One thing to be sure of is that Kuopio has a lot to offer so you don't have to be bored.
