#### Why did you choose to go on study exchange?

Another option is to fly directly to Sogndal with a transfer in Oslo but that is quite expensive and also you have a very short transfer period in Oslo and you need to go through security again. Another option is to fly to Oslo and go by bus to Sogndal. The bus and boat trips are super pretty both from Bergen or Oslo so I definitely recommend them. Ofcourse going be boat is also super fun but better for the way back I think.

Ehmmm I think my room was around 385 euros and I think because eating together is not really a thing their you pay 20-30 euros food per two days so that is quite a lot. Alcohol is super expensive! Like half a liter beer for 2.50 euros and at the student house it is 5.80 per 0.4 liter. (Also important for other students ©)

However, public transport is really expensive in Norway! Like to go to bergen (160 km) it is 54 euros one way. And it takes forever to go by buss and they also do not go that often, so that really makes you appreciate the Dutch public transport infra structure haha.
