The academic level was quite similar to that of Wageningen. However, the work load was much less and we had more time than in Wageningen. Less lectures each week as sometimes I only had 2 lectures each week. It depends on the courses you take how busy you are. Lesson material were lectures posted online and handouts, but also depends on the subject.

Very approachable lecturers, very kind and open. Small classes so lots of personal attention. You can ask many questions and get to know your classmates easily. At the WUR, the classes are often very big so you get less personal attention. Students at the WUR seem a bit more approachable than students at UiB because Norwegians can be a bit shy.

Very nice catering and lunch opportunities. Sports did the university not offer but more the Sammen housing (Idealis of Bergen). Nice libraries that were tidy and had enough room. Coffee places around the study places for not too expensive.

Very kind people that can always talk English to you. People want to help you. Local cuisine is a lot of meat and fish so as a vegetarian it is sometimes difficult. Habits are that people are a bit shy and quit, but when they get to know you they are super kind. Polite people. I always felt safe and could go for evening walks alone without feeling scared.

Groceries are more expensive, but the housing price was quite okay. Sports and gyms are about the same price.

Cost of public transport was quite okay. The bybanen was not that expensive if you buy a period ticket for half a year. Taxi prices are very expensive! To travel to the university you take the tram to the last stop and then you walk around 15 minutes to the faculty through the city. Very nice walk. Biking is also possible but there are not a lot of bike paths.
