My motivation to go on exchange was firstly because I wanted to live in another country and because it meant I could really step out of my comfort zone to meet all new people.

This university was actually my second choice but I really wanted to go to Lapland because it was already on my bucket list. The climate therefore attracted me most to go.

What is it like to study there?

E.g. study forms, academic level, examination, workload, lesson material. In general, the subjects are not mega difficult, the workload also depends on each subject, sometimes it can be a bit more than another subject. But I would say the workload is less than in the Netherlands. The academic level is quite high, so the professors have a lot of information about the subjects they teach. The examination is taken differently according to each subject for example, I had to take a written exam for two subjects. And some work with writing an essay and presenting a presentation.

What is the culture of the university?

The professors are actually very easy to approach and are always open to it. The local students are also very helpful.

What does the university offer students additionally?

E.g. catering, sports facilities, laundry facilities?

The university is open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, so you can enter anytime as a student. You just have to ask for a key fob at the front desk and with it you can enter at any time. What we often did was watch a film in one of the lecture halls. The university also offered a delicious lunch every day with both vegetarian options, also for only 3 euros.

5.Housing-travelling-living

What are the possibilities for housing?

E.g. Availability to sign up for a room on campus, private rooms, rent rates? It is actually very easy to find a room in Rovaniemi. This is because there is a housing association that arranges all student rooms, namely DAS. You then have to register on the website and fill in that you are an exchange student and they will give you a furnished room. I had a pretty big room and I shared the flat with two other girls.

What is the culture of the country like?

E.g. Differences with home, local cuisine, habits, manners?

In terms of culture, there are a few differences, for example, Finns love their personal space. So if you wait for a bus, for example, they will always stand 1 metre from you. Finns generally don't like small talk, but they are always very helpful if you have a problem.

Could you give some information about public transport infrastructure? *E.g. Cost public transport card, taxi prices, how to travel to the university?)*

In Rovaniemi, public transport is not the best. You can take many buses, but for that you need to download the app Walti to see bus schedules. A single ticket costs about 3 euros for 15 minutes on the bus. What I would recommend is buying a bike from a former

exchange student or from a second-hand shop. I actually always used my bike to get around the city. So it is definitely possible to cycle on snow.
