As is very easy to reach with the Flixbus, because the bus stops in As. The connection with Oslo (by train) is also very good, so train and plane are also good travel options.

What is it like to study there?

E.g. study forms, academic level, examination, workload, lesson material. The level of the courses is generally comparable with the WUR, but the workload is lower. The tempo of the courses is much slower than what you're used to at the WUR so you'll be able to easily keep track of all your courses. One thing that is different are the teaching methods. At the WUR you usually have lots of tutorials and practicals, at the NMBU you mostly have lectures and a lot of self-study is expected.

What is the culture of the university?

The lecturers are, in my experience, a little more 'distant' than those at the WUR. They are still approachable for questions but they are less likely to tell a joke or share a personal story. The (Norwegian) students can also be a bit more distant. They are usually quiet during lectures and don't ask questions often.

What does the university offer students additionally?

E.g. catering, sports facilities, laundry facilities?

The university has excellent sports facilities as well as lots of mental health facilities.

5.Housing-travelling-living

What are the possibilities for housing?

E.g. Availability to sign up for a room on campus, private rooms, rent rates?

The university offers housing for international students with priority. Often you'll be able to get the first room you applied for. The exchange coordinator will explain how you have to sign up for housing, usually about three months before your arrival. There are not many different types of rooms to choose from, but the rooms that usually get assigned to internationals are all of good or even excellent quality. Overall, I was very satisfied with my room. I rented a room with private bathroom and shared kitchen for about €440. All student housing buildings are located at about a 10 minute walk from campus.

What is the culture of the country like?

E.g. Differences with home, local cuisine, habits, manners?

Norwegians tend to be quite introverted. Don't expect your Norwegian roommates to be very outgoing, although the chance is high there will be other internationals in your corridor who keep the fun going. I definitely recommend joining an association, the people are already more open once you have something in common. Local cuisine is... bad. Norwegians eat a lot of meat and fish and potatoes. They do have delicious potato pancakes.

Could you give some information about public transport infrastructure?

E.g. Cost public transport card, taxi prices, how to travel to the university?)

Public transport in Norway is generally of very good quality. Ås has a train station with trains going to Oslo about five times an hour. The train ride takes about 25 minutes. There are many buses all with frequent departures, and until late. The university and the city centre are all reachable by foot (Ås is not a big town). There is no student discount on public transport.
