Because I wanted to experience a new study environment. I love Wageningen as well but I also wanted to change it up a bit. I was curious about other cultures as well. I've also heard from other people that it's an amazing experience.

What is the reason you chose for this country/university?

I chose Norway because of the nature! Bodø is also very close to the Lofoten and the ferry is free when you travel by foot. But I mainly chose the university because of the courses they offered.

I think it's also amazing to go to Bodø by train! I personally chose the airplane because I was traveling with my family in the first week but the next time I visit Bodø I want to go there by train.

What is it like to study there?

E.g. study forms, academic level, examination, workload, lesson material. It's really different than it is from Wageningen. Personally, I thought the workload was lower than in Wageningen but maybe that was also because we only had 3 exams over the whole semester. I also think the lectures were a bit 'slower' than in Wageningen. But it was a bit more challenging to learn for the exams since there were a lot of lectures we had to learn for each course but the exams were doable. Some people are learned from the lectures but I liked to also use the books that were provided by the teachers.

What is the culture of the university?

E.g. How approachable are the lecturers, engagement with local students? What are the differences with the WUR?

The lecturers are very approachable and also very nice. They prefer it if you refer to them with their first name and the Oceanography lecturer even learned all of our names beforehand. The classes were also smaller compared to the WUR.

What does the university offer students additionally?

E.g. catering, sports facilities, laundry facilities?

There are different sports you can join and there's also a climbing hall nearby the university. There was also a cafeteria at the university. I personally didn't join any sports since I was more than happy to just walk around in the nature.

What are the possibilities for housing?

E.g. Availability to sign up for a room on campus, private rooms, rent rates? The university has student accommodations that are provided by Studentinord. People from abroad get a special code which gives them a priority for the housing. So finding a place to stay was very easy.

I think Norwegian people are very shy. They're also very helpful when you ask them any questions but I don't think they're very social. I personally really loved the Norwegian brown cheese which tasted a bit like caramel.

There's an app called Reis Nordland which you can use to buy tickets from. You do need a credit card for this app but the monthly pass is relatively cheap (like 30 euros) and will allow you to travel all over Nordland by bus. Most student accommodations were a walking distance to the university but we needed to travel by bus to get to the city centre.

7. Free time

What are must-sees in the area?

E.g. nearby destinations, how do you prefer to travel, when to plan? You really MUST go to the Lofoten. I personally loved Værøy the most, but you really have to spend the entire day there so it would be best to do in the summer. I also went to Reinebringen multiple times and the view is amazing. However the steps can be slippery when they're wet and you really need good spikes if you go there end of October. I wouldn't recommend going there in November or December if you want to go hiking. Saltstraumen is also really nice and there are a lot of mountains you should try like Keiservarden and Hunstadtoppen.

What does not appear in a travel guide, but is definitely worth a visit?

Do you have general tips and tricks about leisure time?

E.g. recommendations for restaurants, going out?

For restaurants, I recommend Tiger Sushi (cheap sushi!) and Burgasm (the burgers and shakes are AMAZING). I think the most popular club in Bodø was Dama Di but I personally didn't like the music too much. There was also a cinema in the city centre if you want to watch movies. Personally I spend most of my free time outside or hanging out with friends at our living room 5.

What challenges did you encounter and how did you overcome them?

I got homesick after my family visited for a week and then they left again. Luckily I had amazing roommates and friends that lived in the same house that cheered me up. I also called my parents and grandparents a lot.

The darkness also was a bit of an issue, I think it's very important to go outside in the few hours it's still relatively light. And to buy lots of candles .

What is your best memory of your time abroad?

I think all of my memories I made with my new friends. One time we walked up Hunstadtoppen and the we saw the Northern Lights all over the city and around us, that moment was truly amazing.
