Yes, it was very clear on the website which courses were thought in Finnish, Swedish or English and which were suitable for exchange students.

c. I had sufficient possibilities to select suitable courses in my <u>field of interest</u> (Yes, No - Explain):

Yes, first I had a problem with it because I had to stick to the faculty of forestry, but then when they moved me to another one I had no problem with finding courses.

d. I am satisfied with the <u>level of the courses</u> that I followed (Yes, No - Explain):

Yes, some courses were more demanding than other courses, but overall it wasn't too much work for all of them. I thought the courses were overall a lot of independent work.

e. I am satisfied, in the end, with the <u>selection of courses</u> I followed (Yes, No - Explain):

Partly, because most of my courses in the first period of my exchange were online, which was a bit boring not meeting any people and was not good for my motivation. But in the second period I had more interactive courses. Content-related the courses were all good and fit my interest very well.

f. What is it like to study there?

E.g. Study forms, academic level, examination, workload, lesson material? The workload was not very high for my courses, but I heard from other students it really depends on the course. Examination was different for many courses. Mine were either open-book and online, or in an examinarium, a room with computers and camera's where you had to book a place. I personally liked the flexibility of it. I've also heard of people making exams on paper as well. The study forms were for me predominantly lectures or online modules. I had one course where we had to hand in assignments and give a presentation. But I've heard that other people had more diverse study forms.

g. What is the culture of the university?

E.g. How approachable are the lecturers, engagement with local students? What are the differences with WU?

In my experience there was not much contact between the students and lecturers, but that could also be because of the courses I chose. The engagement with local students was not really present, especially with the regular lecture courses and online courses. With the one group assignment I noticed that the local students were not really wanting to connect with the other group members like I've sometimes experienced at the WUR. But personally it did not really matter to me.

h. What does the university offer students additionally?

E.g. Catering, sports facilities, laundry facilities?

If you want sufficient, warm and cheap lunch, Helsinki is the perfect spot to go. The vegetarian options were even cheaper and the lunch coffee was cheaper than normal. You get a good filling meal that complies with the Dutch wheel of five.

You can buy a membership at unisport, which is not as cheap as in Wageningen but also not very expensive. Moreover, student rights offer a lot of discounts, for example also for public transport.

5. Housing-traveling-living

a. What are the possibilities for housing?

E.g. Availability to sign up for a room on campus, private rooms, rent rates? Rooms are generally pretty expensive in Helsinki. Most people I know rented studio's or private rooms with a shared kitchen/bathroom from student housing. They all paid a lot for their rooms. Some people did not even get a room close to their campus. I got lucky and rented a private room with shared kitchen/bathroom that was very cheap and was very close to my campus.

I did not live with Finnish people, but overall they are more reserved. I have heard from other people living with Finnish people that they don't really talk or seek any contact. But of course this is a stereotype. I have met many Finnish people that are outgoing and willing to strike a conversation.

c. Could you give some information about public transport infrastructure? *E.g.* Cost public transport card, taxi prices, how to travel to the university?

When you are on an exchange you can get a discount on public transport, which is handled in the introduction week. Taxi's are very expensive, Ubers are cheaper. I walked to the university, but most people took the bus.
