The oral examination and report for AGF211 is a good format to asses the course, whilst AGF212 follows a more conventional assessment form (exam + report) which is still good enough.

g. What is the culture of the university?

E.g. How approachable are the lecturers, engagement with local students? What are the differences with WU?

Culturally, it felt quite similar, it's a very open university with a small campus where everyone knows each other. Since its even smaller than WUR, everyone knows each other and it has a cozy vibe. The professors are very open and you can have a casual conversation with them (and might meet them at the bar, it's a small place).

h. What does the university offer students additionally?

E.g. Catering, sports facilities, laundry facilities?

There is a cantina but not much else, by nature of it being small. Nonetheless you can get by without much issue (laundy is part of the housing, for example, and there is a local gym).

E.g. Availability to sign up for a room on campus, private rooms, rent rates? The housing is organised through Samskipnaden and they ensure there are enough rooms. It's next to the campus and you have many options. It's about 500eur/mo when I went.

Totally different culture, as could be expected from a tiny city at the end of the world. It's very small and tight knit, with a strong academic bubble (stronger even than Wageningen). There is quite a lot of international influence, so there is varied international cuisine there, manners are direct, as in the Netherlands, but people are quite closed.
