How is the study formalized? (E.g. study forms, academic level, examination, workload, lesson material)

Compared to the WUR, the workload was a lot less than what I am used to. This was pretty nice, because I had time to explore Sweden and its culture, but I did miss the challenge and I was not that eager to learn anymore. So I would have liked it to be a bit more challenging. The exams were, on the other hand, definitely at a right academic level, so in the first course there was a bit of a level mismatch.

What is the culture of the university? (E.g. How approachable are the lecturers, engagement with local students? What are the differences with the WUR?)

The teachers are so friendly and approachable, just as at the WUR. They were a bit more chaotic, so contacting them was a bit of a challenge sometimes. Other than that, the whole university is so relaxed, where the WUR can be a little stressed sometimes, so I really liked that. But they were sometimes too relaxed, creating no challenge for the students, and I love a challenge (the WUR always provides that).

What does the university offer the student additionally? (E.g. Catering, sports facilities, laundry facilities?)

There was a great gym at the campus and there were a lot of restaurants/cafes. Also, there was enough space to sit and almost one microwave per student. Great facilities:).

The SLU gives you an accommodation. I had a great apartment close to the university, but you can also get an apartment in the city, which resembles the Haarweg a bit. It is fine and all the apartments for exchange students are fully furnished so that is great.

The Swedish people are way more relaxed than the Dutch and they are very polite. The efficiency is lower than what I am used to in the Netherlands, but it is great for an exchange period to be around these people.

Could you give a general price indication of the place of residence compared to living in Wageningen?

I would say Sweden is a bit more expensive than Wageningen, but not much.

Could you give some information about public transport infrastructure? (E.g. Cost public transport card, taxi prices, how to travel to the university?)

Since Uppsala is a big city for Swedish standards (4th biggest in the country), the infrastructure is perfect. You can take a lot of busses to campus or the city centre. Outside the city however it can be a bit of a struggle, if you want to go away from the city area. Luckily the nature is beautiful so you don't mind the walk that much. Going to Stockholm is super easy as well, it just takes you about an hour by train and it is quite cheap if you book smart.

I can definitely recommend Stockholm, I have been there four times and still love the place. Even though it is a capital it is super relaxed and there is much to see. Furthermore, we rented a car in one weekend and did a road trip to Norway, probably the best weekend ever ③.

There is a big lake close to campus, Lake Ekoln. It is very pretty and you can walk through the forest that goes around the lake.
