Level is a lot lower than in the Netherlands. You almost don't have any assignments and the exams are easy. The nice thing is that the classes are small and you have quite a lot of practicas, so you really learn it by doing. What also was quite strange for me is that they did not have any book or sometimes neither the slides online, so that you could self-study a bit.

This is very good at the faculty. The faculty is localized a bit outside of Sevilla and only has about 400 students and only a couple of international students. This results in the fact that basically everyone knows you and it is very easy to integrate with them. As said earlier, the classes are very small and the teachers are very approachable.

What does the university offer the student additionally? (E.g. Catering, sports facilities, laundry facilities?)

The canteen is great. A good lunch costs 4 or 5 euros.

You can find a room through websites such as idealista, piso compartido, room sevilla & viverasmus. I definitely recommend to go a week before and stay in a hostel to find a room.

The climate and extrovert people of Sevilla results in the fact that you spend your days on the streets. You eat and drink everyday outside basically, which is possible because sevilla is extremely cheap and still warm in winter. The timetable is totally different, as you lunch (warm dish) around 2 or 3. And then have dinner around 10.

A lot cheaper. Vegetables in the supermarket are almost half of the price as in Wageningen. The room costs around 300/350 euros. Going for tapas costs 7-10 euro and half a liter of beer between 1 and 2 euros.
