3. Accessibility to reach destination

Do you have any tips to reach your exchange destination? (E.g. bus, train, etc.)

Just take the plain to Barcelona airport. There is a bus called the Aerobus which goes every 10 minutes from both terminals to the city centre. It is only 5,9 and very fast. When you're in Barcelona for longer than 3 months, it is best to buy the T-jove card for €100 which you can use for the bus, metro etc. It is unlimited and cheapest to do.

In General it is quite good. Most of the classes I took were nice, but some, like strategic management not so much. But in general the academic level, examination and workload is very good and comparable with BBC in Wageningen.

Lecturers are very nice and very approachable. Not a lot of contact with local students. There is more of a high school vibe than the somewhat more serious vibe here in Wageningen. Also Spain stays Spain so there are some things that are a bit less practical than in Wageningen. (A lot of paper work to take care of, they do not use online forms)

What does the university offer the student additionally? (E.g. Catering, sports facilities, laundry facilities?)

The university had some catering facilities, I'm not sure about sports but in general very good. They offer good options for international students with ESN etc.

A lot of Erasmus houses and rooms for international student. Lot of options online. I paid 580 for a small room but with a big living room and kitchen in the city centre.

Spanish or Catalan people I must say, are very nice. Most are very proud of being Catalan so do not call them Spanish. The city has a very chill vibe with a lot of people in the streets. Cuisine is very nice with paella, tapas & sangria!

It is more expensive in Barcelona then in Wageningen. Rent is higher, groceries depend on where you go, but going out is way more expensive.

The metro is ideal to travel around with. If you're there for longer than 3 month, buy the t-jove card for 100€ and this can get you almost everywhere. Also the university is reached very easily by metro!
