How is the study formalized? (E.g. study forms, academic level, examination, workload, lesson material)

At UCPH you are only able to follow MSc courses, as the BSc courses are in Danish. Therefore, the academic level is quite high I think. However, as this is also the case at WUR, I did not feel I had to work much harder than I did back home. Examination is often in the form of a written assignment and an oral exam. This was new to me, but turned out not to be too difficult.

What is the culture of the university? (E.g. How approachable are the lecturers, engagement with local students? What are the differences with the WUR?)

Lecturers are super open and social, and always willing to help you out. Local students are friendly, but will probably not become your friends as they know each other quite well already.

Sports facilities are offered during introduction week. On campus, you can find 15 different student bars, which are the best places to go for a beer with your fellow classmates or friends.

5.Housing-travelling-living

I found housing via the University (got an offer after I signed up), and I lived together with 4 international roomies in a shared flat. I really enjoyed this place!

Danish people are very friendly and everyone speaks English fluently. Therefore, there is no urge to learn Danish. My favorite Danish food were the cinnamon rolls!

I payed 630 euros per month, while in Wageningen I pay 360. It is a lot more expensive, but it is also a capital and I lived in a popular neighbourhood. Denmark in general is also a bit more expensive in general. In the end, I think it is worth the price for sure.

Everyone in Copenhagen bikes everywhere. So, to travel around the only thing you need is a bike and a OVcard (rejsekort) in case you want to go outside the city.
