Primarily lectures with quite some assignments that need to be handed in. The academic level was a bit lower that I was used to. The workload tended to peak, between quieter times and a sudden bursts of much work

The lecturers were always very friendly and open to questions. Also the students are all very friendly (generally the Irish are very open and friendly people). The engagement with the other students came primarily by joining all the sporting/culture clubs and associations.

There are multiple catering options on campus. Furthermore there are plenty of sport clubs and culture societies that are all free to join so you can try out as many as you want!

5.Housing-travelling-living

In Galway it is very hard to get a room. You can try to get a room via a private-sector landlord although this can be sketchy sometimes.

I would recommend to try to get a room in corrib village or goldcrest village. This is provided by the university but you have to be really quick as the demand is very high.

I paid 470 (twin room in corrib village, which means sleeping with another person in your room) a month.

My advice is to start early or if you don't succeed to first stay in a hostel and then the university will help you.

What is the culture of the country like? (E.g. Differences with home, local cuisine, habits, manners?)

The irish are very friendly and will chat to you out of nowhere.

There is a real pub culture so you will meet your friends in a pub and have a few pints while listening to live music.

Could you give a general price indication of the place of residence compared to living in Wageningen?

- Rent is a bit higher than Wageningen (rent between 450 600)
- Groceries around the same price when going to Aldi or lidl
- A night out in Galway is probably the same as when going to a bar in the Netherlands
- Public transport is a bit cheaper

Public transport is pretty reliable between the big cities and is also not that expensive (student fees). You can get a leap card which further decreases the price when using public transport regularly.

I bought a bike as this got me around town a lot quicker and I definitely recommend getting one.
