Why did you choose to go on study exchange?

How is the study formalized? (E.g. study forms, academic level, examination, workload, lesson material)

The study form is a combination of lectures, groupwork and some field work. The academic level is a bit lower for the two courses I did than on Wageningen University, which made the workload lower. The examination was fine, the test was clear, the only thing I would improve is for it to be possible to look into your exam and be able to see if it was corrected well. The lesson material was similar to Wageningen.

What is the culture of the university? (E.g. How approachable are the lecturers, engagement with local students? What are the differences with the WUR?)

Lecturers were very approachable which was really nice, and we would call them by their first name. Local students were mostly in my second course and they would keep together a lot, but through group projects this mixed up a bit. Although I would suggest not making the groups yourself but mixed everyone up with everyone so that you meet some people you would normally maybe not do

groupwork with, like locals. On the WUR I do normally engage more with international students so this is a bit different.

What does the university offer the student additionally? (E.g. Catering, sports facilities, laundry facilities?)

There are some little kitchens on campus which was very nice, but not much more that I'm aware of.

5.Housing-travelling-living

Really well done, the university gives them first to international students, it was very easy to get a room. The instructions were very clear

What is the culture of the country like? (E.g. Differences with home, local cuisine, habits, manners?)

The biggest difference I would say is that people are a bit more to themselves than Dutch, and they keep together more, but if you approach them, they are very very friendly. Local cuisine was similar to Dutch, with potatoes and meatballs, but the patisserie was a bit different and they had some national holidays that don't excist in the Netherlands (Three Kings day on the 6th of January and Santa Lucia on the 13th of December

Could you give a general price indication of the place of residence compared to living in Wageningen?

It was a bit more expensive than the average in Wageningen, about 100 euros on average

Public transport was very well done, I had a bicycle though, so I didn't use it as much. But the times I used it it was very on time and very accessible, but it was quite expensive, unless you had a subscription and you would use it a lot.

The islands around Gothenburg are really nice, very cosy as well, especially around Christmas, with some small Christmas markets. Also lake Desjon is very beautiful, and if you are lucky it is even frozen in winter to ice skate on! Because it was not too far I also visited Norway in between, which I would highly recommend. And Stockholm is a beautiful city to visit too, about 3 hours train ride from Gothenburg.

What does not appear in the travel guide, but is worth a visit?

The little nature area next to the Botanical garden is beautiful and far bigger than I initially thought, and it is really nice to go there for an afternoon walk.

Do you have general tips and tricks about leisure time (E.g. recommendations for restaurants, going out?)

Cooking most of your food yourself will save you a lot of money, but I would recommend going on fika (Swedish coffee/tea time with cake) with friends after uni, because it is so cosy and a great way to get to know people a bit more.
