There is not a lot of interaction between the professor and students and between students themselves during class. Lesson material is not very challenging either compared to the social science papers I have to read at the WUR. Examination was varied, orals, papers and written exams.

I would say that local students do not mix/interact a lot with international students. Italians like to stick with Italians, which is completely fine because there are many international students who love to connect. The lecturers are not very used to interacting with students, but when you do approach them they are very open to talk to you and are interested in your background and interests.

There is catering (not very tasty food though) better pay a couple of euros extra and get some real pasta/pizza! Sports facilities are ridiculously dated and pricey, better to subscribe to a private gym.

The year I went to Padua, accommodation for students was a serious problem as twice as many international student arrived compared to other years. Very difficult to find something and prices were absolutely ridiculous. Normally it should be easier as there are many options. The university offers rooms, but they are not amazing and have 'rules'. Many apartments and rooms are offered at Facebook pages, best to find one in advance (don't get scammed though!). Normally rooms should be priced similarly to rooms in Wageningen.
