These 3 courses only have lectures and some non-mandatory excursions and oral exams at the end. You don't need insight, but instead they expect you to be able to just recite what has been said in the lectures. Still, they are quite relaxing, allowing you to enjoy more important parts of your exchange

Lectures always start late, not respecting the time and effort of the student to be there on time. Their English usually isn't that good. Local students are really nice and very liberal and gay friendly.

What does the university offer the student additionally? (E.g. Catering, sports facilities, laundry facilities?)

Unibo does not offer you anything except for a 10 euro bus card that you can use without a limit.

Nothing is done by the university. Your best chances are things like dovevivo, the student hotel or erasmusU

The food is great, the people are nice and everything is a bit more laid back. You will get annoyed by their negligence though. They can also be very strict in their rules and will follow them without thinking (not lenient with exceptions or personal circumstances)

Supermarkets are just as expensive, housing is around 600 euro, train tickets are pretty cheap, restaurants are also not too expensive as is clubbing

There are buses, but the centre of bologna is small enough that you can do everything by foot or by bike. Try to buy a bike in your first week. The Agriculture faculty is 30 minutes by bike from the centre should you go there
