Because it is a big city you also see some homeless people sometimes which is of course very shocking and sad. The local cuisine is mainly meat based but there are also some vegetarian dishes and the city Budapest offers a lot of trendy vegetarian restaurants.

Could you give a general price indication of the place of residence compared to living in Wageningen?

Most people paid between 300-400 euros a month for a room. So I think its similar to Wageningen, if not cheaper ©

The transport in Budapest is very good! You can always get anywhere by either tram, metro or bus (even in the night after a party). The BKK (transport in Budapest) offers a travel card for students which is only 9 euros a month.

There are a lot of nice wine area's nearby such as Debrecen and Eger. You could do a city tour and winetasting there. Also Szentendre is a very cute city to go to once you're there. And Budapest is one of the fewest cities that has some hills in Hungary, so you could go for a hike on the Gellert hill or Normafa. Also the thermal baths are very nice and can be very cheap, Dandar is only 6 euros for students.
