I had a shared apartment that I subrented from a girl who also went on Erasmus exchange. I lived with two germans and another exchange student. I payed around 370 euro for 20m2 furnished room. All my friends were in the campus of CAU, which also looked good and with fairly cheap prices I would say. Locations differed a bit, so I would suggest to look into that carefully.

Stereotypes of Germany are sometimes true I found out. Punctuality and bureaucracy are high on the list. For the rest the Germany and Dutch culture are quite similar, which makes life easy there in a way. Though, German techno is a big thing there!
