# How is the study formalized? (E.g. study forms, academic level, examination, workload, lesson material)

- 1. Field notebook hand written (no limit) and case study (3000 words)
- 2. Paper (2500 words)
- 3. Popular science article (1000 words) and a group poster (800 words)
- 4. Paper (2000 words), Blog (500 words) and presentation (15-20 minutes)

Academic level is the same is in Wageningen, however they expect you to read a lot of papers and articles.

The workload is pretty much the same as in Wageningen.

For every course you have 3 hours in a week of lectures, fieldtrips and seminars (here you discuss the papers you had to read). 12 hours on average per week. The rest is self study

Not a lot of groupwork, mainly individual assignments.

# What is the culture of the university? (E.g. How approachable are the lecturers, engagement with local students? What are the differences with the WUR?)

There is a student village with mainly first years, so it is really easy to meet friends there. Besides, there are several external and internal parties who organise events which are really easy and fun to join.

If you live in the village, like I did, you have to take a bus to the campus, which is not that reliable at all, but you can also walk for 35 minutes. I would say that that is the only downside to the village.

## What does the university offer the student additionally? (E.g. Catering, sports facilities, laundry facilities?)

There are sport facilities on the campus as well as in the village (not a lot of options and it costs around 60 pounds for 3 months).

All university accommodations have laundry facilities nearby.

And as I said the university offers a lot of extra events which you can join and where you can meet people. In general the people in Leicester were really nice and open and willing to help you and willing to become friends. Which in my opinion is a big plus.

University of Leicester has an accommodation office and a website which are helpful. If you sign up for housing before a certain date you get a guaranteed accommodation.

Leicester is one of the most diverse places in the UK if not the most. So, it is a bit different, but not shockingly different to the Netherlands.

You will pay 90 to 150 pounds per week, so that is compared to the rest of the UK pretty cheap, but if you compare it to Wageningen some rooms can be a bit expensive.

Buses have the same price as in the Netherlands. If you live in the village there is a free bus between the campus and the village. If you want to travel from city to city I would suggest taking the National Express buses, these are really cheap in comparisons to the trains, which are very expensive.

The downside to Leicester is that it is a kind of boring place if there are no other students, cause there is no national park or must see nearby.

I would suggest see Diwali as Leicester has the biggest celebration in Europe. Go to Bonfire night. See the curry mile and have a meal there. Watch a horse race in Oadby. See the Market in the center. Go to the botanic garden oadby. Watch a Leicester City football game. Go to National Space centre. Take buses to other cities like Nottingham, London, Manchester, Birmingham (German Christmas market), etc.

#### What does not appear in the travel guide, but is worth a visit?

The things I mentioned above. Especially the horse racing and Diwali are cool experiences.

## Do you have general tips and tricks about leisure time (E.g. recommendations for restaurants, going out?)

Meet other people and see what they are up to.

Another suggestion is don't buy the freshers wristband, but buy the separate events. You have to go to 8 parties in 14 days to get you money back, I would say not worth it. Leicester is a relatively cheap city.

Not having payment options, you need something like Mastercard or PayPal to do your online payments, or if you for example want to use the laundry machines.
