We did not even have to use sources when writing papers etc. I can imagine that for the Spanish students coming to WUR it will be too big of a difference and too hard, because I can honestly say that besides a lot of Spanish, I did not find the courses challenging.

I followed lectures all in Spanish and wouldn't know about the English ones. However the level of education was very low and there was not much interaction with the local students. Erasmus students do live in their own separate bubble.

They offer everything mentioned above, and Erasmus offers some get to know activities for students as well.

5.Housing-travelling-living

There are many online websites and companies that have houses especially for foreign students. You pay a lot and get taken advantage of in some cases, but overall they are trustworthy regarding the room and it can be fun living with other foreign students. I find my room through the company HelpHousing, its similar to all the other ones out there.

What is the culture of the country like? (E.g. Differences with home, local cuisine, habits, manners?)

Expect to live your Dutch time schedule, but only 3 hours shifted later. Classes until 8 pm and dinner at 9 or 10. Many life outside on the streets and it just never stops.

Could you give a general price indication of the place of residence compared to living in Wageningen?

I payed 510 rent for a big and light double room in the centre of Madrid, but in an old student house with 7 other people. This is excluding other expenses which for me were around 50 a month, so 560 in total. However, this is more when you live with less people. In Wageningen I payed 375 all in. Also, all the house renting companies for foreign students really take advantage of you, so that is just something you have to keep in mind and prepare for. Its hard to avoid so do not try too hard. You will end op paying a down payment of a month rent + a deposit anyway in all cases. Also, be prepared for some unexpected costs because the company will try to blame you for everything that gets broken in an already old house. So take pictures of EVERYTHING also common areas when moving in. I was prepared for all this so not surprised when they came with extra costs, but they are not fair and only out for your money remember that.

6. Free time

What are must-sees in the area? (E.g. nearby destinations, how do you prefer to travel, when to plan?)

You travel by metro in Madrid. There are some daytrips to other towns nearby that you can make, but Madrid itself offers enough to do and is quite isolated from other big cities nearby. Valencia on the coast is a 4 hour drive but totally worth it.

What does not appear in the travel guide, but is worth a visit?

I really enjoyed visiting Valencia by train and going to the San Isidoro Festival in May.

Do you have general tips and tricks about leisure time (E.g. recommendations for restaurants, going out?)

Madrid is not the cheapest city for going out, but there is SO much to do. It never sleeps and there are endless amounts of bars, restaurants and clubs. There is a really big night life so I would definitely suggest not putting all your classes in the early morning, and start a bit later (10 am earliest, just like the Spanish) cause otherwise its hard to keep up. Many student activities also start from 11 pm onwards.

7.Challenges & best moment abroad

What was a challenge you have experienced?

That because of the siesta, schedules are weird and if you do not want to stay on campus from 9:00 to 20:00 everyday, you have to drop some classes. So that's what I did.

What was your best memory abroad?

That I met amazing people, had so much fun experiences and nights and ended up speaking Spanish basically fluently.
