# How is the study formalized? (E.g. study forms, academic level, examination, workload, lesson material)

Most of the work for the courses was self study. Per course, I only had one contact hour per week. Most of the examination consisted of essays. The academic level of most courses was quite low. As a student with limited pre-knowledge, I was able to follow third-year courses without any problems.

# What is the culture of the university? (E.g. How approachable are the lecturers, engagement with local students? What are the differences with the WUR?)

Lecturers are approachable, but engagement with students is not stimulated. A large difference is the smaller amount of contact hours.

There are meal plans and cafés on campus, there are large amounts of sports societies, a gym, laundry facilities, activities for students in halls, a students union on campus where you can go clubbing.

Student housing is similar to Dutch housing, but organised by the university and with cleaning included. Rooms are all private, but rent rates are extremely high. However, room availability is great.

British people are not very open, so it costs a lot of energy to get to know them. Because of the regular cleaning, the students are not very independent and are very messy. Local cuisine is not amazing, mostly meat and a lot of fat.

# Could you give a general price indication of the place of residence compared to living in Wageningen?

I lived in one of the cheaper buildings with a kitchen: shared facilities and a small room. However, I paid 800 euros a month. If you have sufficient time before your exchange, I would recommend looking at private accommodation outside campus.

### Could you give some information about public transport infrastructure? (E.g. Cost public transport card, taxi prices, how to travel to the university?)

Public transport is quite expensive, but for students there are discounts. Download the Reading buses app and try to buy a 16-25 railcard (in the trainline app). Taxis here are not very expensive.
