What is it like to study there?

E.g. study forms, academic level, examination, workload, lesson material.

It is quite a light workload, with only one to three hours of class a day, and little self-study (although I am not sure this applies to all courses). The courses were good level, not too difficult, but definitely interesting and bringing critical thinking. I found the course contents much clearer and simply explained than at the WUR. The examinations were very doable if you study only in the month of January, with a mix of seen and unknown questions.

What is the culture of the university?

It is a very friendly university. In third year, classes are quite small, and the lecturers are therefore very approachable. They treat their students like friends, are called by their first names. There is much closer contact with them than at WUR, I find.

What does the university offer students additionally?

E.g. catering, sports facilities, laundry facilities?

There is a food hall on campus, but as accommodation is only a 5-10min walk from campus, I did not use it often. There is wide range of sporting facilities, wit football fields, rugby fields, swimming pool, gym, small bouldering hall.

I really recommend Pentre Jane Morgan, as most exchange students go there. It is similar to a little student village, and borders the forest. It's beautiful:)

Wales has a very friendly and kind culture. People are very approachable, and can quite often spontaneously come to talk with you in the street. It's quite beautiful. There is a very slow lifestyle in mid-Wales, the countryside feeling I suppose, yet a very open-minded countryside. There is a heavy drinking culture, especially amongst students, but you also have opportunities to go out to the pubs without drinking. They have great pool tables!

At the town's scale, you can take taxis or buses up and down the hill (from campus to town). But it does cost money, so be ready to get your legs muscled up;) There is a really good bus network across Wales, mostly going up and down the coast. You can get to the bottom of the Cader Idriss mountain for example, if you want to go hiking. Or all the way up to Anglesey and Bangor. Really recommend!

Not sure, simply everywhere in Wales is quite beautiful to wander in the fields. You will meet many sheep. Celtic rainforests are beautiful if you manage to get to one.

Wander through the hills, you meet wonderful people, animals, and learn about yourself. In Aberystwyth, I really recommend the Bank Vault pub for some diverse musical evenings. It's a small pub with music ranging from folk, to Spanish, gipsy, jazz..
