I would say that the academic level is medium. If you want to pass and obtain a good grade, you definitely have to put in work and effort. Though the level, in comparison with the WUR, is a little lower.

In Bologna the academic pace was going very slowly. The lectures took 3 hours, while the actual content could easily be explained in 1,5 hour. Besides, the professors often arrived 20 minutes too late, which is a huge cultural difference with the Netherlands.

What does the university offer the student additionally? (E.g. Catering, sports facilities, laundry facilities?)

The libraries in Bologna were great. There were lots of options to study outside the classroom.

5. Housing-travelling-living

Housing in Bologna is very difficult, since the university does not offer any help or accommodation. Therefore, you need to handle everything by yourself. I found my room through international WhatsApp groups.

The culture in Italy is so different from the Netherlands, way more laidback and relaxed. For example, the nightlife begins to start around 10pm which would be very late in the Netherlands.

Could you give a general price indication of the place of residence compared to living in Wageningen?

I paid 700 euros for my accommodation, and it was not even in the main centre. So the prices for accommodation in Bologna are relatively high in comparison with other destinations.

Bologna has a great train station, so it is very easy to make a lot of trips to other Italian cities. There are also busses, which arrive often a little late, but are also a good way of transportation.

In Bologna definitely the San Lucca Basilic. Other place I really liked were Verona, Cinque Terre, Florence, and Lago di Como.
