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What is it like to study there?

The academic level felt the same as in the Netherlands even though I only followed master courses I felt it was very doable. We didn't have any assignments and almost no group work in between the courses which for me was difficult because you know less how prepared you are for the exams. Also some of my exams were oral which was different than what I'm used to.

What is the culture of the university?

The Erasmus organisation was very approachable and they organized nice activities in the beginning to get to know fellow students. Engagement with local students was harder because they mostly spoke Italian with each other. Some of the lecturers were quite rude and difficult to approach while others were very kind and open.

What does the university offer students additionally?

E.g. catering, sports facilities, laundry facilities?

In the mensa (cantine) they offer meals almost all days during lunch and dinner, they always have pasta or pizza for around $\le 3/3.50$ and other meals that differ day to day with meat, potatoes, etc. The university offers some sports including volleyball and football. They also have Whatsapp groups people interested in hiking etcetera. The university has different committees/groups which organize activities. These differ from more cultural actitives and movie nights to parties. Furthermore within an hour you can get on the slopes for skiing and snowboarding which is very popular.

What are the possibilities for housing?

E.g. Availability to sign up for a room on campus, private rooms, rent rates? There are some buildings with student housing available for which you can sign up. There are double or single rooms. If you do not get into those you have to find housing yourself which can be difficult but is very possible.

It is a mixture of Austrian and Italian culture which can be especially noticed in the food and the language. I mostly noticed that many Italian people are very free and can decide or change things last minute. This might be specific for my study because it was quite new but often for example the laboratory or external activities would be decided at the last moment.

Could you give some information about public transport infrastructure? *E.g. Cost public transport card, taxi prices, how to travel to the university?)*

For around €150 you can get abo+, which is a public transport card which can be used in the whole South-Tyrol and is valid for trains, busses and some funiculars. It takes a while to do all the paperwork to get the card but I found it very worth it. Otherwise you can use the app SüdTirolMobil to buy separate tickets.
