I expected more interaction with students, but there was a distance with Spanish students as only the international students (which were not many) follow the English courses. Also still the people our age are not very comfortable talking in English. There is however a big international student association that is very active and also organizes travels to bigger cities and Morrocco for example. The teachers were very approachable and they really like that you come to their Uni.

What does the university offer students additionally?

E.g. catering, sports facilities, laundry facilities?

There are much more cafeterias than in Wageningen. A lot of people buy lunch there, it is quite cheap. There are sports facilities but there are no weekly training except for swimming I believe.
