Lectures are really approachable, most classes are not bigger than 30 students. Teachers will learn your name.

There is a canteen in the buildings, I think it offers sport, but maybe with discounts and not on the campus. You can find all the facilities in the mycorvinus app.

5. Housing-travelling-living

There are a few dorms, however I would recommend to look on housing anywhere or smarthomeappartment. You can find nice rooms in apartments for affordable prices.

Hungarian is a very difficult language, so you will always feel some kind of distances to most locals. Hungarians are not the most friendly people, but the one you will meet from your own age are very nice! Local cuisine is a lot of meat (goulash) and sweet things like chimney or salty things like Langos.

Could you give a general price indication of the place of residence compared to living in Wageningen?

Average rent is between 350 and 470. Groceries are a little bit cheaper than in the Netherlands. Other things like beer or general things are cheaper than in the Netherlands.

Taxi's are not cheap, but not expensive (download Bolt). Public transport is really good, you can take the metro, tram or bus, also during the night. For a public transport card for the whole semester, you pay 44 euro's.

6. Free time

Lake Balaton is really nice, when the weather is great. Bratislava and Vienna are nearby. In Budapest you can just walk at the buda side, visit heroes square or go on top of the Bazilika

What does not appear in the travel guide, but is worth a visit?

The swimming pool at Margaret island when the weather is nice. The prosecco cruise is also a nice activity to do.

Do you have general tips and tricks about leisure time (E.g. recommendations for restaurants, going out?)

Restaurants: 26 and mazel tov are really nice. You can find the best food in town (imo) at Két Szerecsen. Best Italian restaurant is il mulino.

Going out: Instant is really nice, but really touristic in the weekends, you will love it in the beginning, but feel tired of it at the end. Morrisons 2 is the best place to go on Monday (Erasmus evening) and Thursday (open bar for 11 euro's if you enter before 12). If you like techno, you should visit Playground, Arzénal and maybe Akvarium (depends on their program). Other nice places are, Stifler Haz, Doboz and Szimpla Kert (although quite touristic).

If you like football, try to attend a game at the Puskas arena.
