It differed a lot per lesson. I thought that some courses were quite hard, not easy to follow and a lot of work. Other courses did not have a lot of workload. I think for the academic level that it was maybe a little higher than I expected. I thought that it would be really bad, but it turned out to be of quite some quality. The examination though, was nice. Passing a course was easy if you showed up to class and did your assignments well enough.

I like the culture there. I had lots of small classes with around 20 students and it was really personal. The teachers tried to learn our names and being interactive was necessary. I liked that. At WUR is totally different, where there are more big lecture halls with lots of students and some practicals but those are still with around 40 people

### Could you give a general price indication of the place of residence compared to living in Wageningen?

Around the same. In Budapest I ended up paying 400 per month inclusive gas, water, electricity. In Wageningen I pay 300.

## Could you give some information about public transport infrastructure? (E.g. Cost public transport card, taxi prices, how to travel to the university?)

You can get a student semester card for 40 euros which is valid for 5 months, and it allows you to make use of public transportation throughout all of Budapest. I mostly walked to university. If you wanted to go outside of the city it was also quite cheap. Back and forward by a one hour bus was around  $\{2,50\}$

### What are must-sees in the area? (E.g. nearby destinations, how do you prefer to travel, when to plan?)

The highlights of the city. Some nearby other cities (Vienna, Prague, Krakau, Bratislava). Going by train or flixbus is how I went to those places. Both were really nice travel options. But also exploring Hungary was nice, going to other places there and the Balaton lake. You can go by train or bus, it is really cheap.

#### What does not appear in the travel guide, but is worth a visit?

Etyek; a really cute little wine town where you can drink a glass of wine for €1,50 between the vineyards.

## Do you have general tips and tricks about leisure time (E.g. recommendations for restaurants, going out?)

Lampas is a really cheap student bar, instant a really big club with loads of rooms and ruin bars like szimpla and fuge udvar are really nice.
