What is it like to study there?

E.g. study forms, academic level, examination, workload, lesson material. It is nice to study at Unifi, but sometimes I missed a little bit space to study somewhere. There are some study rooms, but not many. However, most of the time I studied with some friends at public libraries or other public study places. The workload and examination were easy to follow, but sometimes there was not enough access to lesson material, which made some exams confusing. But this depended on the course, the professor, and his / her methods.

What is the culture of the university?

E.g. How approachable are the lecturers, engagement with local students? What are the differences with the WUR?

The culture at the university is quite open to Erasmus students. There are a lot of international students, which makes it easy to connect during lectures and group work. I liked it a lot that most of my courses were filled with internationals. Lecturers are well approachable, and they are there to help you. :)

What does the university offer students additionally?

E.g. catering, sports facilities, laundry facilities?

The university offers catering facilities and there are some cafes on the campus. You get access to the university library. For sports facilities and other activities, you can engage and take part in ESN / EG / AEGEE / IC Firenze activities. These are student associations which offer a lot of activities, trips, and other facilities for international students.

5.Housing-travelling-living

What are the possibilities for housing?

E.g. Availability to sign up for a room on campus, private rooms, rent rates? I rented my room via HousingAnywhere, which is a verified platform. Rent rates differ between various types of accommodations and locations. I had a private room and I shared the apartment with four roommates, with whom I shared the kitchen and two bathrooms. The university does not provide housing, so you must take care of that yourself.

What is the culture of the country like?

E.g. Differences with home, local cuisine, habits, manners? Italian culture! Ate a lot of pasta, drank a lot of wine, and enjoyed a lot of sunsets at beautiful places in Tuscany. Within Erasmus contexts and during studies, I spent most of my time with internationals, not many Italians.

For public transport in Florence, there is a monthly card of about 38 euros to travel with bus and tram. Single tickets are 1,70 euros and valid for 90 minutes. There is also a bike system in which you pay for your ride, and you can grab a bike anywhere (Ridemovi).
