What is it like to study there?

What stands out the most is way less contact hours than at WUR and the workload and examination is quite low. We never had to buy a book or reader. Most lesson material are the lectures, so make sure you visit those!

What is the culture of the university?

Lecturers are very approachable, maybe even more than at WUR, which has already a high level. I had mostly contact with other exchange students, but Swedish students are certainly approachable as well.

What does the university offer students additionally?

I found that university sport facilities we're lacking. But, the vast amount of nature compensated more than enough (hiking!).
