2. Motivation for exchange

Why did you choose to go on study exchange?

I wanted to explore a new place and experience a different culture.

What is the reason you chose for this country/university?

I felt more comfortable going to a country where I could speak the main language, I had never been to North America before, and going to Canada had always been on my travel bucket list. Additionally, the University of Guelph had great electives to choose from and I liked how it wasn't located in a big city like Toronto.

3. Accessibility to reach destination

Do you have any tips to reach your exchange destination?

It is easiest to fly into Toronto Pearson International Airport. I traveled around Ontario and Quebec before going to Guelph, so it was very convenient to already have a rental car to get there. However, I get that this isn't the easiest way if you would be going to Guelph directly. The cheapest option is to use public transportation, however, this might be inconvenient with multiple suitcases or bags, therefore, I would say a tip that I would give is taking a taxi together with other exchange students as splitting the cost of the taxi makes it significantly more affordable.

What is it like to study there?

E.g. study forms, academic level, examination, workload, lesson material.

I followed courses that contained both lectures and seminars, which are similar to tutorials/ work groups. The academic level was similar to Wageningen University's, if not a bit easier. Out of the 5 courses that I followed, only one had a final exam. Other forms of examinations are quizzes, midterms, and assignments ranging from 300 to 3000 words. The workload was doable with the right planning, as there's a lot of self-study required but there are only two meeting times per week that together take up 3 hours on average. The lesson material consisted mostly of lecture content but in addition, required readings such as media, textbooks, or scientific articles were provided.

What is the culture of the university?

E.g. How approachable are the lecturers, engagement with local students? What are the differences with the WUR?

Most of the time the course coordinators are also the lecturers and they are very approachable before or after the lectures, easy to reach via email, and they also organize weekly office hours during which everyone is free to visit them if needed. Engagement with local students is quite easy through group projects or during seminars. Additionally, engaging with other students is achievable by arriving early for lectures and talking with the people who sit around. I feel like it is pretty similar to WUR, however, the lectures do not contain any breaks and they also are not recorded.

What does the university offer students additionally?

E.g. catering, sports facilities, laundry facilities?

There are a lot of food options on campus ranging from coffee places like Starbucks to dinner options such as pizza, pasta, burgers, a salad bar, and much more. The Gryphons athletics center is also located on campus and contains several sports fields and gym rooms for football, soccer, (ice)hockey, basketball, volleyball, and there are also two swimming pools and a rock climbing wall. Every residence building has a laundry room with several washers and dryers that are quite big and rarely occupied all at once.

What are the possibilities for housing?

The University of Guelph guarantees a room on campus for exchange students when they apply before a certain deadline. The room options and rent rates for 2023-2024:

What is the culture of the country like?

E.g. Differences with home, local cuisine, habits, manners?

I think the culture in Canada as a country wasn't that much different from the Netherlands. Canadians are very friendly, often willing to help if needed and make you feel very welcome. It is very normal to ask someone how they are and have a little chat when seeing them on campus and it is common to hold open the door for someone even if they're a bit further behind. A very North American food-related culture is the presence of many fastfood chains. Tax (13%) isn't included in the prices and it is customary to leave a tip between 10-20%, which can significantly increase the prices.

Could you give some information about public transport infrastructure? *E.g. Cost public transport card, taxi prices, how to travel to the university?*)

Public transport in Guelph is included in the payment to the University of Guelph for residence and additional costs. The campus has a bus station located in front of the University Centre and the campus card can be used to check in on buses. The public transport between cities in Ontario, known as GO Transit, consists of both trains and buses. The GO buses go from the bus station on campus and another option to access GO transit is GO buses or the GO train from Guelph Central Station. Taxi prices are quite high, however, sharing an Uber with other students can be affordable and worth it sometimes. When living in residence, all university buildings on campus are easy to reach by walking. When living off campus, Guelph transit buses can easily be used to get to the university.

Additional remarks regarding expenses?

Depending on which residence building, it can be compulsory to buy a meal plan. There are different types of meal plans for different prices, however, doing groceries and cooking if there is a full-sized kitchen in the residence will be cheaper than the smallest meal plan.

7. Free time

What are must-sees in the area?

E.g. nearby destinations, how do you prefer to travel, when to plan?

Toronto (GO Transit), Niagara Falls (MEGA bus from Toronto), Algonquin Provincial Park (bus tour from Toronto), Canada's Wonderland, or Ottawa/Kingston/Montreal (train). The easiest way to travel is by car since this would also allow to see more of nature, however, it is quite difficult to rent a car as an exchange student. I would recommend using public transport (combined with an Uber) or getting a ride from a local student.

What does not appear in a travel guide, but is definitely worth a visit?

The My Kitty Cafe and The Donkey Sanctuary of Canada in Guelph.

Do you have general tips and tricks about leisure time?

E.g. recommendations for restaurants, going out?

For me, the Stampede Ranch, which is a place to go out, is definitely worth a visit. It feels very Canadian and is worth the experience even if you're not into country. When going out, it is important to realize that most places have entry fees and drinks can usually only be bought with cash.

Some restaurants that are nice and not too expensive are East Side Mario's and Montana's.

8. Challenges & best moment abroad

What challenges did you encounter and how did you overcome them?

Not all debit cards are accepted in Canada. This can be overcome by getting a Canadian debit card, a credit card, or an international account through companies such as Wise. Getting affordable data is challenging, however, some smartphones are compatible with eSIMS. A phone number is not needed most of the time, making an eSIM the most affordable option to get a decent amount of data.

What is your best memory of your time abroad?

At the end of the semester, I and some of the exchange friends I made during the first week of START International went on a trip to New York together. However, I don't think I have one favorite memory and it is more about being grateful for all the amazing people I have met and spent time with during my time abroad.
