What is it like to study there?

I only had lectures, which I really enjoyed. The work is a lot, but easy to finish in time because one period is 4 months. The material is really interesting with lecturers who also work in the field.

What is the culture of the university?

The lecturers are approachable and willing to talk to you 1-on-1. Local students aren't really approachable. But this is maybe because they already have their societies and friends. The introduction week was amazing with the first night only being for exchange students, which is perfect to meet new people. The difference with the wur is obviously the campus. In Keele you don't have to leave the campus if you don't want to, because everything is on there: accommodations, teaching buildings, restaurant, societies, grocery store, etc.

What does the university offer students additionally?

There is a big sport centre where you can try out all different kind of sports. There are launderettes, but these are really expensive. Unfortunately, you don't have a choice, but to use the launderettes.

5. Housing-travelling-living

What are the possibilities for housing?

E.g. Availability to sign up for a room on campus, private rooms, rent rates? International students can get a room on campus if they want to. This is the easy and most convenient option. However, it is very expensive (twice the rent price, compared to my room in Wageningen, and twice as small). I had one of the more "cheap" options and then you don't have a living room or a place with a table and chairs. You just have a kitchen, two showers and two toilets you have to share with 16 people.

What is the culture of the country like?

E.g. Differences with home, local cuisine, habits, manners?
English students are used to going to their parents every weekend. The cuisine is really high in calories. A general breakfast is scrambled eggs, sausage, and toast with beans. It is normal for students to bring bags of crisps to the lectures and eat it (even in the morning). Their manners are kind and social, but their appearance is a bit fake because for girls it is normal to wear hair extensions, fake lashes, a lot of make-up and not a lot of clothes. Vaping and smoking are very common among students. On campus there are more cigarette bins than there are general bins.

Unfortunately, the campus is not accessible by train, but there is a bus every 15 min. On average, a single bus trip is 2 pounds (2,10 euros), and within 30 minutes, you are at the train station (very comparable to Wageningen, hahaha). The train station is amazing because it is almost in the middle of England. This makes it easy to travel wherever you want. You can buy a railcard for 30 pounds to get a discount of 1/3th of your ticket price every time.
