After these ten weeks there is time to do revision, write essays and prepare for exams. Academic level is somewhat lower than at wur so is the workload. My examination existed merely out of essay writing, so no exams.

Culture is much different from Wageningen, since Wageningen has an extremely buzzling student life. Student life in England exists more of going to the pub. Everyone in the UK is very friendly and approachable. You won't experience any type of discrimination and the language barrier is of a minor proportion. I primarily hanged out with a British group which I really loved. Unfortunately, there is no such thing as ESN so for trips and other activities you need to take initiative yourself.
