What is it like to study there?

It was very hard to identify the academic level. It differs among the years that you study. The lessons were really interesting but thy were based on literature and not on textbooks. Which made the workload very high because you had to study literature, which can be abstract sometimes.

What is the culture of the university?

The lecturers are very helpful. They know a lot about their topic. They do not necessarily work at the University, which is different form the WUR.

What does the university offer students additionally?

There are a lot of student societies, from sport to reading clubs. So you will definitely find something that fits you. There is one building that carries a lot of food facilities, pizza & pasta, chips with toppings etc. And in every building you can buy coffee and sandwiches. The laundry facilities are situated at the accommodation. However, this is quite expensive, 5 pounds for washing and drying.

5. Housing-travelling-living

What are the possibilities for housing?

E.g. Availability to sign up for a room on campus, private rooms, rent rates?

You can sign up for rooms on campus or you can find a room by yourself in Leicester. You have to accommodation sites, the City and the Village. The Village is situated in Oadby, a town next to Leicester. You can reach this via the Unibus. Rooms here are quit cheap however you have to travel for 30 minutes to go to campus.

The City is situated next to campus. Rooms here differ in prices, from 400 pounds per

month to 600 pounds per month. It depends on how luxurious your room is.

What is the culture of the country like?

E.g. Differences with home, local cuisine, habits, manners?

The population is very differs. You find a lot of Indian food places, or Asian. There is not much local cuisine in Leicester. You can find some pubs but I would not say that the food is great.

British people are very polite. They can say no even to not bother you or ask if you want anything just to be polite and expect you to say no. So if you are Dutch, make sure that they know that you are direct and if you ask them anything that you mean it. Also, they say sorry a lot. And if they say, Hi how are you doing? Do not answer. It is just a way of saying hello.

Trains are quiet expensive. But if you buy a railway card for 30 pounds you can get 30 percent off of train tickets. Which is really helpful, because you will earn that money back. Also buy tickets via trainline. Because they use splitsave to sale cheap tickets.

The buses are not really reliable. And the regulation now is that every bus trips costs 2 pounds, which can be really cheap for long travels but really expensive for short trips. However, Uber is a widely used for traveling. And this can be really cheap as well.

Housing costs per month & type of housing/accommodation: 400-600 pounds Groceries: 30 pounds per week (40 euros) but depends on what you buy.

depends on where you are going. Short train trips can cost around 10 euros.

Books are very cheap. You if you are a reader, go to the Works or Waterstones. I bought around 18 books for in total 50 pounds. So around 3 pounds per book.

The city center is pretty nice. But I would recommend visiting nearby cities.
