There is catering at the university but the meal plans are expensive so I wouldn't recommend. You can use the sport facilities for free, which is nice!

I lived at iHouse, which was nice! A bit messy, but not too expensive and you get to know a lot of people.

Buses are free in Corvallis. There is also safeRide. A free taxi service for students in the evening hours. You can make a reservation in the app and they pick you up for free. In Corvallis, a bike can be nice but you can also walk everywhere.

All the national parks (crater lake, smith rock state park, red wood forest) and the cost (Newport). We rented a car in the Hertz office in corvallis every time. If you get an AAA membership you don't have to pay for underaged (under 25) driving. This safes a lot of money!!
