What is it like to study there?

To be honest, things are a mess at the university. It can take weeks before you have a response to your mails and the introduction was chaotic. Expect it will take some time before everything is fixed and you get your schedules, bureaucratic organisation is not the strongest point here.

Academic level was fine for me, the level of the exams however is lower than in Wageningen. Lectures range from very good to useless depending on the professor. Workload at FEUP is quite high in comparison to other faculties, it is known for that here.

What is the culture of the university?

University culture was not so much to my liking, it felt a bit like a high school with student playing computer games during the lectures and a very noisy library.

The Portuguese cuisine is good on fish, try some Arros de Marrisco for sure. Most people are very friendly and polite and will certainly try to help you, especially when you try in Portuguese.
