Historical perspectives form the foundations for wine classification systems and traditional serving procedures. Cardinal scale sensory evaluations are conducted in relationship to various food pairings. Must be 21 years of age or older to register for this course. Permission of department required.	4	
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What is it like to study there?

E.g. study forms, academic level, examination, workload, lesson material. It is really fun. I did not think the courses were super difficult. The way of teaching for some courses are quite different though. With the ANSC courses I had barely any tests, it was mostly writing essays and/or a bigger writing project.

What is the culture of the university?

Super fun! Very large communities, for every hobby or sport there is one. I would say people are very welcoming too. Therefore, it is quite easy to make friends.

There is also a 'Boiler Gold Rush (BGR)', which is similar to the AID in Wageningen. I also

recommend doing that to make some friends and explore the campus.

What does the university offer students additionally?

E.g. catering, sports facilities, laundry facilities?

Depends on where you live. I lived in a dorm, so that was a shared room. You shared the bathroom with the whole hallway, but that was also very doable. Laundry facilities are shared (also you need to pay for that). I had no kitchen, so I had to buy a meal plan to eat in the dining courts. The food is pretty good, I honestly had no complaints. A lot of different options, and you can eat as healthy (or unhealthy) as you please.

5. Housing-travelling-living

What are the possibilities for housing?

E.g. Availability to sign up for a room on campus, private rooms, rent rates? Be on time, but I think for international students housing is always quite easy to get into. You just have to sign up with the housing portal for a dorm room or apartment. Dorms are cheaper than an apartment but have no kitchen.

There is also opportunity to live in a co-op (big, shared house), but I have no experience with that.

What is the culture of the country like?

E.g. Differences with home, local cuisine, habits, manners? Very Midwest American core! Very nice people. Sometimes a bit too fake nice though. But I had no real big culture clashes.
