How is the study formalized? (E.g. study forms, academic level, examination, workload, lesson material)

The workload is a lot less than in the Netherlands. During my courses I had a lot of space to focus on my own interests within sustainability, which made me make my assignments in a very creative way. I also had no exams but only written preparations. Overall, it was a good workload for an exchange where you also want to enjoy your time.

What is the culture of the university? (E.g. How approachable are the lecturers, engagement with local students? What are the differences with the WUR?)

The lecturers are very approachable. I have followed courses at CEMUS and everything there is student-led. So it was really easy to ask questions or ask for help.

There is a sport facility in the city centre (Campus1488) and we could do the laundry in our own building. There is also quite good food at the universities and places where you can warm your food.

5. Housing-travelling-living

SLU organized the accommodation. I could give a preference in which student building I wanted to live. I chose Rackarbergsgatan, which was definitely the best choice because it's close to the city centre and new.

What I noticed during my exchange is that Swedish people are very kind and organized, but also not too social. It felt like I was in a bubble of international students because it was harder to mingle with the Swedes. But the culture is a lot the same with the Dutch one in broader lines.

Could you give a general price indication of the place of residence compared to living in Wageningen?

Living in Sweden is expensive. This is really something you should prepare for before going on an exchange: you will spend more than you think you will. I think the rent is almost the same and for the size of your room is quite fair. Groceries are a little more expensive. But as my exchange would go by, I could recognize the cheap finds in the supermarket for example and would go to parties of the nations where the beer and wine are cheaper.

Could you give some information about public transport infrastructure? (E.g. Cost public transport card, taxi prices, how to travel to the university?)

Uppsala is very accessible by bike. Everyone buys a bike in the first week (there are a lot of second-hand bike shops). It is also possible to travel by bus but that is much more expensive. A single ticket is 39 SEK.

Day-trips to Stockholm, a trip with the partyboat to Tallinn, the student tour to Lapland, and going to Oslo by bus. There are also a lot of hiking opportunities which you should not miss.
