I heard from a friend that went her last year that she really enjoyed her time here and she thought the landscape architecture courses were very good. I also wanted to go to an English speaking country and it was also close-by so a bit cheaper to travel to.

3. Accessibility to reach destination

Plane is quite a lot cheaper than train if you book it far in advance and with Easyjet (but less sustainable of course). Take the coach bus the university provides from Manchester to Sheffield, its 25 pounds.

What is it like to study there?

E.g. study forms, academic level, examination, workload, lesson material. Academic level is a little bit higher than in Wageningen regarding landscape architecture (average skill level of designing is a bit higher). However, you can definitely still get a passing grade if you just do your work in time.

Study forms: you have feedback sessions once a week in almost every course, where you can approach the teachers and they will give you useful feedback.

In the green infrastructure course study forms was mostly in field trips, so you will get to see a lot of the city/the UK.

Examination is about the same, mostly portfolios you had to submit

Workload is about the same, so quite high for landscape architecture but probably not for other majors as I've heard from housemates. They only had maybe one class a day. So just depends on your major.

Lesson material is literature, but mostly your own designing of course.

What is the culture of the university?

E.g. How approachable are the lecturers, engagement with local students? What are the differences with the WUR?'

Lecturers are very approachable and friendly, you can always ask for feedback since you have a tutoring session every week.

What does the university offer students additionally?

E.g. catering, sports facilities, laundry facilities?

There are more facilities than in Wageningen.

You can sign up to their gym which just got rebuild and is quite big, also a nice swimming pool.

They have lots of computers in the library or in the Arts Tower, that you can use, that already have many Adobe programs installed + AutoCad.

There are many cafes/food places nearby where you can grab something to eat for about 5 pounds.

Laundry facilities are mostly at your own apartment. However, they are really expensive, its about 3 pounds for a wash and then 2 pounds for a dry. I'd recommend buying a drying rack and buying something where you can combine all colours together.

5. Housing-travelling-living

What are the possibilities for housing?

E.g. Availability to sign up for a room on campus, private rooms, rent rates? You can get housing with the university, but they are really expensive than if you would get housing outside of that. I really regret it, because I heard from people that lived there, that said it should be possible to get a room much cheaper private.

What is the culture of the country like?

E.g. Differences with home, local cuisine, habits, manners? Culture is very friendly overall, people are very nice, employees often say 'love', Not much local cuisine. Everyone walks, not bikes!

Could you give some information about public transport infrastructure? *E.g. Cost public transport card, taxi prices, how to travel to the university?*)

Get a 1-year railcard!

You can travel by bus to campus if you live far away, it's about 1.20 pounds per ride.

If you do say you are a student so you get a discount and show your university card.

I don't think getting a biycycle is useful since there are no bicycle roads so it can be more dangerous than in the Netherlands. Plus it is very mountainous.

Arts Tower and go to the highest floor!

Sign up to a study association you like and participate in the daytrips the university provides!

Also recommend getting lunch at 'falafel king', <u>really</u> good wraps for about 5 pounds!
