How is the study formalized? (E.g. study forms, academic level, examination, workload, lesson material)

The hours are a lot, compared to wageningen, and everything is mandatory. So the days are long but not intense, as there is no dense education or information provided. The workload apart form contact hours is not much at all. Studying for exams was not necessary and group work could be finished during school hours most of the time.

The academic level was very very low, I know this sounds exaggerated, but really, I learned more in high school (but I think they will really change their courses, so I don't know about next year).

The examinations were most of the time kind of a joke. One time we made the same multiple choice exam three times, and the answers were provided, and this counted as 30% of our grade for this course. This was not an exception. A lot of the times, our examination consisted of making a game or a presentation.

What is the culture of the university? (E.g. How approachable are the lecturers, engagement with local students? What are the differences with the WUR?)

The culture on the university is very pleasant, I felt really welcomed. The exchange team did everything to help us and everything was taken care of. The lecturers were approachable, and the students were very kind and keen to get to know us. Also fun to know, the program is mixed with international and French students, which is very fun, because you really get to know French people this way.

What does the university offer the student additionally? (E.g. Catering, sports facilities, laundry facilities?)

With your student pass, you can get Izly, with which you can eat for 3,30 (lunch and dinner) at Crous restaurants. It is amazing. The university also offers several housing options, which they will email you.

5.Housing-travelling-living

What are the possibilities for housing? (E.g. Availability to sign up for a room on campus, private rooms, rent rates?)

The university sends you a list of several possible accommodation offers. I lived in Crous Arsenal, comparable to the student flats in Wageningen. The location was amazing, really there is not better location, and the rooms are very cheap. It is small, and you kind of live alone, but I had great time.

What is the culture of the country like? (E.g. Differences with home, local cuisine, habits, manners?)

I did not really experience culture shock. Ofcourse there are differences, but they are rather small, and I or my friends had no hard time with it. I do recommend to try to learn the language.

Could you give a general price indication of the place of residence compared to living in Wageningen?

It can be very cheap. I lived for 245 per month, and a friend of mine rented a studio, which costed 500, but with CAF subsidies (which you can get if you rent alone) it was als oaround 250-300.

I would recommend renting a bike. There is a place close to the main station which costs I think 9 euros per month with good bikes. And a metro card is 12 euro per month. Very cheap.
