How is the study formalized? (E.g. study forms, academic level, examination, workload, lesson material)

I would not say that the courses are of academic level, there were a lot of games, for example and escape game that we had to make which had nothing to do with the course content. The days were very long, often from 9 until 5 which was very tiring.

What is the culture of the university? (E.g. How approachable are the lecturers, engagement with local students? What are the differences with the WUR?)

The university is very small, it feels more like a high school. The people from the international office are very approachable and will help you with any problem you encounter. But the freedom that I am used to at university is completely lacking, because all the hours are mandatory.

What does the university offer the student additionally? (E.g. Catering, sports facilities, laundry facilities?)

There are no extra facilities. The BDE, which is something like the university council organizes some parties and activities.

5.Housing-travelling-living

What are the possibilities for housing? (E.g. Availability to sign up for a room on campus, private rooms, rent rates?)

I found a room quite quickly via an Erasmus platform for housing. There are no rooms on campus, but we got an email from the international office at purpan with some possibilities for housing and they could also help you find a room if you couldn't find anything. The rent is similar as in the Netherlands I think. Maybe a little bit more expensive because you rent a furnished room for a short time.

What is the culture of the country like? (E.g. Differences with home, local cuisine, habits, manners?)

It is quite similar but there are also some difference. French people really like to strike and they are less direct than dutch people. They eat a lot of meat.

Could you give a general price indication of the place of residence compared to living in Wageningen?

I payed 520 euros for my room of 11 m2, but the apartment also had a living room and all the furnishing was very new and well maintained.

Could you give some information about public transport infrastructure? (E.g. Cost public transport card, taxi prices, how to travel to the university?)

You can get a tisseo card which is valid in all the public transport in Toulouse for approximately 12 euros a month. I rented a bike, which was 8 euros a month. I didn't use taxis.

6. Free time

What are must-sees in the area? (E.g. nearby destinations, how do you prefer to travel, when to plan?)

Albi and Carcassone are nice cities close by to visit. The pyrenees are also very nice for a hike when you have a car. Every first weekend of the month the trains cost only 1 euro so that are always good weekends to take the train and explore nearby cities.

What does not appear in the travel guide, but is worth a visit?

I think Toulouse itself is a very nice city. There are almost no tourists so that is good. It is a pretty city with a lot of good places to eat or drink.
