What is it like to study there?

The workload is intense, but they give you an extension if you need it. The lesson material was interesting and in-depth. The study form consists of group assignments, individual assignments, and lectures. The examination includes midterm and final exams but not for all courses. It might be a paper or a project. Depending on the courses, the lesson material includes lectures, literature reviews, or readings from a digital book.

What is the culture of the university?

The lectures are easy to follow, but some courses are not recorded and do not have a live stream option. It is easier to engage with local students than at WUR as an international student.
