- **b. I had sufficient possibilities to select suitable courses that were <u>taught in</u> <u>English</u> (Yes, No Explain): Yes, BOKU has a lot of courses like a lot. The courses are often only 2 or 3 ETC meaning that BOKU offers a lot of courses in general. English courses are a big part of that. I do want to mention that some of the English courses were supposed to be in English but that slides still contained quite some German and figures in German.**
- **c.** I had sufficient possibilities to select suitable courses in my <u>field of interest</u> (Yes, No Explain): Yes a lot of option regarding soil science and I was very happy with that. Hydrology was also possible, to a lesser extent meteorology.
- **d.** I am satisfied with the <u>level of the courses</u> that I followed (Yes, No Explain): No, the courses were very often not detailed and too qualitative for me. So if you like that then that's great, for me it was all a bit too superficial.
- e. I am satisfied, in the end, with the <u>selection of courses</u> I followed (Yes, No Explain):

No, I chose courses with exams that were all scheduled in June which was very stressful. I also really regret two courses that were taught very bad.

f. What is it like to study there?

I experienced BOKU as a very chaotic university. It offers a lot of courses which gives you the opportunity to really follow specific courses that you like and also a lot of them. However, you will experience a lot of course overlap because you will have to follow a lot of courses due to the small courses (2 or 3 ETC). Though, it is manageable and teachers are willing to reschedule exams or help you of you explain the problem. I followed mainly courses with exams, that are easier and less material than in Wageningen, but there are a lot of variety of courses such as excursions which I would recommend and I do regret not taking such courses. The workload is less than in Wageningen.

g. What is the culture of the university?

Teachers are less approachable than in Wageningen. For me the teachers in Wageningen are super approachable and you have sort of a connection with them. Here that was not really the case for me, but they are open to any questions! So you can still ask questions. Mailing depends per teachers, some were rude and some were very nice. There is less pressure and stress at BOKU compared to Wageningen so that gives a nice atmosphere.

h. What does the university offer students additionally?

There is catering, sports (I did not follow any), lots of activities for Erasmus students! BOKU did that very well with a great introduction week and lots of activities throughout the semester.

5. Housing-traveling-living

a. What are the possibilities for housing?

Housing was very good and easy for me. They provide a lot of providers for student housing. I had OEAD and that was super nice. You can rent yourself and I also heard some students with private renting.

b. What is the culture like?

The same as in the Netherlands, but depends on what you are used to in Wageningen of course.

c. Could you give some information about public transport infrastructure?

It is amazing in Vienna and super cheap. You pay around 80 euros for a semester ticket and you can travel with that card by metro, bus and tram throughout the semester.
