2. Motivation for exchange

a. Why did you choose to go on study exchange?

I felt that this was a once in a lifetime opportunity (which it is) and wanted to take it. I had completely settled in Wageningen and was looking for a new challenge and opportunity to grow, the exchange perfectly fitted this purpose.

b. What is the reason you chose for this country?

I was not ready to go outside of Europe and I really wanted to live in a metropole for a while as I had always lived in small villages. I had never been to Vienna before but the courses were really interesting to me as I wanted to learn some basics of the CAD programme (and they offered courses in that). In addition, I had learned German during high school and wanted to develop it further by following some courses in German. But I found out that the biggest plus to Vienna is being in the middle of Europe. You can travel to so many neighbouring countries and this was amazing!

c. What is the reason you chose for this university?

Mainly the options for courses, but no other university in Vienna (nor Austria) has a connection to the Wur for landscape architecture.

3. Accessibility to reach destination

a. Do you have any advice about reaching your exchange destination?

At first I went by plane, it was comfortable and has a very easy connection with train into the city. Nevertheless, I would recommend going by train. After Christmas holidays I went back by a night train goes directly to Vienna. It is quite comfortable, and you do not need to buy a bed as the chairs can extend into a sleeping place. It is a lot cheaper than flying (around 35 euros on NS international if bought on time), you arrive in the morning and have all the time to reach your sleeping place and it is a bit of an adventure!

b. I had sufficient possibilities to select suitable courses that were <u>taught in</u> <u>English</u> (Yes, No - Explain):

Yes, the master courses are easy to follow (even for bachelor students) and are always in English. However, try to mail as early as possible to the exchange office if there is a different possibility to register for the courses because the current students can register earlier than exchange and fill up the courses. There is still a lot of other courses which can be followed but this happened to me and was a bit disappointing.

Yes, there are a lot of courses for landscape architecture, but I ran into the same problem I explained in b)

Yes, I feel that course 2,4 and 5 really added to my knowledge. The rest was interesting but I would not reselect them now.

Yes, I am happy with the courses but still feel it could have been better if I had been able to stick a little bit more to the courses that I originally wanted to follow.

The lecturers are very nice and easy to speak with (I mostly spoke on first name basis but this can be dependent). People really voice their opinions in the lectures and lively discussions are held. I did not really become close friends with local students but during group work people were very nice and it was easy to join. In comparison to the wur I would the describe the atmosphere at BOKU even a little bit more liberal.

h. What does the university offer students additionally?

Cafeteria, study places, model room for architecture students, gardens and a neighbouring park.

5. Housing-traveling-living

a. What are the possibilities for housing?

There are a lot of student dorms but you need to be in time to have a place. However, it is not dramatic if you don't have a place as there are a lot of houses that also do 'hospiteren. You can find these houses on the website and app: 'WG-gesucht'.

b. What is the culture like?

Everything is a bit more by the book and a lot is done by paper. People are quite friendly and helpful when you know one another (for example from classes) but otherwise people

can be a bit rude sometimes (especially in the metro). I think it is a bit of the big city/metropole like new York effect. Be careful with Sundays as EVERYthing is closed, even supermarkets, I forgot this all the time and caused me to have to get take out.

c. Could you give some information about public transport infrastructure?

It is super nice. The metro is extensive and cheap for students. You can buy a semesterticket online at wienerlinien.at .BUT the semesterticket ends at the official end of classes while you often still have an exam after this period. The day that the ticket ends police checks rigorously and even goes so far to go undercover, so be mindful of this as the ticket exceeds 100,-.
