a. Why did you choose to go on study exchange?

I've always wanted to study abroad since I started studying. I thought of it as a once in a lifetime chance to go and live in another country for a longer period of time.

b. What is the reason you chose for this country?

I wanted to stay in a big city, something completely different than Wageningen. Spain had large cities, and good weather, which quickly made it my preferred destination. This also gave me the motivation to start learning spanish, which is something I've always wanted to do, but never ended up doing.

c. What is the reason you chose for this university?

Barcelona is one of the largest cities of spain, and is located next to the sea. Which provided me with everything I was looking for. A metropolitan feeling that would be completely different to Wageningen, and a nice geographical location where I could enjoy my free time at the beach.

I went by plane. There is a possibility to go by train. But then I would have had to move through Paris with all of my luggage for 5 months because the trains depart from different train stations. This made me choose to go by plain.

Yes, many different courses were taught in english. There are many international students, and even some spanish students take the English courses because they would match their schedule better.

Yes, the faculty had a broad range of subjects and courses in english

d. I am satisfied with the <u>level of the courses</u> that I followed (Yes, No - Explain):

This really depended on the specific course. Overall I was satisfied. But the spanish system is different. And if you do the continuous assessment instead of single evaluation, the course becomes easier (in my opinion). Some courses ended up being a bit to easy, but with so many courses at the same time (5 courses, all having their exam in the last 2 weeks), it was nice because it made the workload manageable.

e. I am satisfied, in the end, with the <u>selection of courses</u> I followed (Yes, No - Explain):

Yes, I am very satisfied. I experienced a completely different way of teaching from what I was used to. The material that was covered also was something I would not be able to have learned in Wageningen, since it was a economic faculty.

f. What is it like to study there?

E.g. Study forms, academic level, examination, workload, lesson material? Very different from what I was used to. People would just arrive 20 minutes late and the teacher did not mind. The classes also mostly consisted of 20-25 people, which is different to what I am used. The type of examination depended on the lecturer. The workload throughout the semester was higher than what I was used to, because I chose continuous assessment for all of my courses.

g. What is the culture of the university?

E.g. How approachable are the lecturers, engagement with local students? What are the differences with WU?

The lecturers were very approachable. We even started all of our courses with a classical introduction. So everyone in the course had to say their name and where they were from, and the teacher was genuinely interested. The engagement with local students depended on the course. In some courses there were only international students. But in the classes with some spanish people, I happened to befriend 2 spanish girls. They invited me to their parents house and to see their hometown.

h. What does the university offer students additionally?

E.g. Catering, sports facilities, laundry facilities?

The uni has cafeterias with a broad range of dishes. Not only bread with ham and cheese or baked things. They also have warm lunch with pizza and pasta options. There is a sporting facility on the campus that you can go to. I haven't been, but friends of mine played tennis there. There are also multiple libraries you can go to to study, but it is very different from what we are used to in Wageningen. They are only open from 9-7 or something and there are (almost) no power outlets (like in the rest of the building)

5. Housing-traveling-living

a. What are the possibilities for housing?

E.g. Availability to sign up for a room on campus, private rooms, rent rates?

I had friends that arranged their room through the university. I however, hired an entire apartment with 4 other dutch girls in the city centre. Just take a good look at the pictures, some of my friends had no real windows in their rooms, or ended up having a mouldy ceiling...

b. What is the culture like?

E.g. Differences with home, local cuisine, habits, manners?

The culture is rather different. It is no exeption to eat around 9.30pm (but you'll get adjusted very quickly to this). Overall going out for dinner is way cheaper than in the Netherlands, so within my friendgroup we went out for dinner quite a lot. There are also many many Catalan holidays. They'll walk around the city with 'giants' and make a lot of noise.

c. Could you give some information about public transport infrastructure?

E.g. Cost public transport card, taxi prices, how to travel to the university?

You can buy a 3-month public transportation card for 42 euro's that you can use in almost the entire region of catalonia (keep in mind that you get 120 euro from DUO as compensation for not using your 'studenten ov' in the Netherlands, so you make a plus). The infrastructure is amazing, metro's arrive every 3 minutes and the night busses are reliable!

a. Can you give an indication of your expenses for/during your exchange?

The prices were lower. Going out for dinner in a group for tapas is rather cheap, Menu del Dia's give you the option to enjoy a three-course meal including water and wine for around 16euros! The groceries are way cheaper than in the Netherlands! Especially fruit and vegetables (and chickpeas and lentils)!

c. Additional remarks regarding expenses?

Through some Erasmus instgram accounts, you can book a trip to Morocco for very cheap! You arrange your own flight, and then for 250euros you get a hotel with breakfast for 5 days and dinner 2 days!

Flights/ferries to Ibiza and Mallorca are also cheap!
