The lecturers are very warm and welcoming people who are very eager about international and their views of their topic in their own nation. In my experience the lecturers suit their lectures/projects depending on the background of the student, so also the lecturers learn something about them and their country. They are very engaging with students compared to WUR.

Engagement with locals is a bit hard if you don't speak Italian, but even a little Italian can really help you make amazing friends as they are very nice welcoming people.

Loads of study places all throughout the city, with cafes attached to them or very near them at an affordable price.

It is very similar to Argentinian culture, and I would say quiet polar opposite than the Netherlands. They are very warming and welcoming, they truly want to get to know you, they love to get to know different cultures (especially now that there is a big immigration of Iranians), they are easy to make friends with (even with internationals with language barriers) they are laid back and spontaneous.

c. Could you give some information about public transport infrastructure?

E.g. Cost public transport card, taxi prices, how to travel to the university? Public Transport is very accessible because you have a very big annual discount. They have a very good train service (arrived on time), very comfortable trains with discounts for the youth/students. For example with night trains, going from Bologna to Sicily (10 hour train) two ways, it cots 80 euros. Also, train rides can cost 2 euros for like a 10 minute train. And to the airport from bologna you pay 20-25 euros and arrive there in 20 minutes.
