The Swedish are very hospitable everywhere you go, always friendly and ready to lend a hand. For me as a person that's born and raised in the Netherlands there were some differences but not major ones. I enjoyed a little slower ace of living and taking more time to appreciate everything that is happening.

For this I paid about 45eu per months with unlimited transport which is really cheap in comparison as to how much I have used it to go everywhere.
