2. Motivation for exchange

a. Why did you choose to go on study exchange?

I decided to go on an exchange because I had one semester left to do free choice courses and I wanted a new challenge to develop myself personally, so studying abroad for half a year seemed like the perfect option.

b. What is the reason you chose for this country?

I chose for New Zealand because I wanted to go to an English speaking country and I heard many great stories about the natural sceneries and culture in New Zealand. It has many varied landscapes within a relatively small distance because of the unique location in the world and the plate tectonics. Its nature and geography really interest me and perfectly fit my study programme, so studying in this country would allow me to see the natural processes I have learned about in real life. Besides that, the size of the country gives the opportunity to easily travel around while studying.

Besides that, its location is pretty central which allows you to travel around the south island during weekends.

f. What is it like to study there?

E.g. Study forms, academic level, examination, workload, lesson material? Studying at Lincoln University is definitely different than in Wageningen. The lectures are shorter and there are more labs/practical and field trips. So instead of a lot of theory, the theory is also applied in real life which made it very interesting. For me it made the studying easier and I feel like the workload is a bit less than in Wageningen. Examination is also different because the courses are divided in multiple exams/papers/practicals and the final exams are all at the end of the semester. So for every assignment you receive a certain percentage and that is part of your final grade, instead of just 1 or 2 exams for a course in Wageningen. The semester consists of 6 weeks for the first half, than a 3 week mid semester break, and then another 6 weeks for the second half, finished by 1 study week and 2 exam weeks.

g. What is the culture of the university?

It's a pretty small university, smaller than WUR. So lecturers are very approachable and there are not a lot of people in a class which feels way more personal. There is one big student association which everyone is a member of and organizes activities for everyone on campus. You can also join clubs to interact with other students.

h. What does the university offer students additionally?

E.g. Catering, sports facilities, laundry facilities?

I lived in a self catered flat which I really liked because all the internationals lived in the flats together and created a fun community. Cooking is easy, the supermarket is closeby, there is a laundry machine and dryer in the flat and the flat gets cleaned every 2 weeks. The sports facilities are great! Amazing gym, climbing hall and sports classes.

a. What are the possibilities for housing?

E.g. Availability to sign up for a room on campus, private rooms, rent rates? In my opinion it's best to live on campus in a flat. Most internationals and older-year local students live there and it's a great community. In the halls it's mostly freshmen and they don't tend to mix with internationals. You can also try to find a room in town but that's harder and further away from campus.

I feel like the culture is pretty similar to Wageningen except that the locals are pretty closed and quiet. They don't talk a lot to internationals. All the internationals are very fun though! And going to rugby games together is definitely a must \bigcirc

E.g. Cost public transport card, taxi prices, how to travel to the university? The bus card is very cheap, only 1 nzd per bus ride and you can easily get a bus card at the bus interchange in Christchurch. The bus takes about 45 minutes from Christchurch to Lincoln. If you want to go clubbing in the weekends you need to Uber back which is not too expensive if you share it with people. The public transport to other places is pretty

hard so I would recommend buying a car or van. That's what a friend and I did together and it allowed us to go on a lot of adventures!
