## b. I had sufficient possibilities to select suitable courses that were <u>taught in English</u> (Yes, No - Explain):

Yes, there were enough course but the English level was not very high overall. Some course seemed to be offered in English but were not really doable unless you also spoke Spanish. Some exams had questions that were translated very poorly or still contained Spanish sentences.

## c. I had sufficient possibilities to select suitable courses in my <u>field of interest</u> (Yes, No - Explain):

No, for my field of interest the choice were very slim, as they were only available in Spanish. I resorted to choosing courses outside my field of interest

## d. I am satisfied with the <u>level of the courses</u> that I followed (Yes, No - Explain):

No, I do not think the courses were very well structured and the small assignments and group assignments were given too much of importance. The quality of the courses was diverse, some were bad.

## e. I am satisfied, in the end, with the <u>selection of courses</u> I followed (Yes, No - Explain):

Yes, I think I choose the best courses available for me. I tried some other courses in the beginning, but they were either not structured enough or the English was too bad. So these courses were my best options.

#### f. What is it like to study there?

E.g. Study forms, academic level, examination, workload, lesson material? The grading system relies a lot more on continuous evaluation throughout the semester. You have to attend every single class, even if nothing is discussed or done. You can get random assignments during class that will count for your grade, but it not always clear how they are graded or for how much they will weight. Feedback is rarely given, not even if you ask for it. Groupwork is important but working together with Spanish students is often difficult, as they are often unwilling to speak in English. A lot of lesson seem useless, and the overall quality is lower than in Wageningen.

#### g. What is the culture of the university?

E.g. How approachable are the lecturers, engagement with local students? What are the differences with WU?

There is not really space for individuality or as much freedom compared to WUR. You are required to go to your lessons, lessons are usually quite standard with just a lecture or small assignment. You listen as the student, there is not a lot of interactions. Rooms are locked for students, only teacher can open them. Lecturers are approachable. But the overall structure compared more to high school than Dutch university. There are almost no places to study or hang out at the campus.

#### h. What does the university offer students additionally?

E.g. Catering, sports facilities, laundry facilities?

There are two restaurants on campus with very affordable food and drinks. There is a university sports centre.

## 5. Housing-traveling-living

#### a. What are the possibilities for housing?

E.g. Availability to sign up for a room on campus, private rooms, rent rates? Lot of housing available, through Facebook, the university residences, Unicasa, Idealista. Prices are fair and usually everything is organised well. Communication is often less good, as their English is very bad.

Everything end a lot later. It is normal to have class till 21 o clock at the university. Dinner starts at 22, and people go out at 2 at night. Cuisine is simple and focussed on meat, not great for vegetarians. People are more outgoing, but do not speak English at all, some speaking Spanish is necessary. A lot more life outside homes.

But there is a very good bus network, you have to buy a bus card ones for 2 euros and each ride with the bus will cost you 30 cents.
