b. I had sufficient possibilities to select suitable courses that were taught in English (Yes, No - Explain): No, the availability of English courses was low and this limited the options severely.

c. I had sufficient possibilities to select suitable courses in my field of interest (Yes, No - Explain): No, I had to choose 60% in my bachelor field. All these courses had overlap with WUR and it did not suit to my interests anymore. I was not able to study what I originally wanted to when deciding to go on exchange.

d. I am satisfied with the level of the courses that I followed (Yes, No - Explain): No, the level was generally very low. Sometimes it felt like I was back in high school. Masters courses were sometimes better but still often it was under my level and it did not challenge me. This is also why I decided to quit two courses.

e. I am satisfied, in the end, with the selection of courses I followed (Yes, No - Explain): No, I was not able to study what I wanted because 60% had to be in my Bsc field. Additionally, the amount of English taught courses was low.

f. What is it like to study there?

The city of Porto is amazing, it is vibrant with many exciting things to do and experience. The Erasmus people are all really nice and approachable. The beaches are beautiful and there are plenty opportunities for surfing. Also the city is affordable compared to other European cities.

g. What is the culture of the university?

The university however is not of good enough standards. The academic level was low and the students were also not motivated to study. Even the teachers were not very motivated and were often late to class.

h. What does the university offer students additionally?

There are canteens but I rarely used those. There are also sports facilities and places to study.

It was quite easy to find a private room online. I signed up for university housing but never heard anything back from them.

Portuguese culture is very social and focussed around being together. Everything is slow and nobody is in a rush. Everyone is always late and everything is flexible.

Public transport in the city is free if you are under 23. The metro is quiet fast and convenient but it does not cover the entire city. There are also busses but these are very unreliable and slow so I rarely took them. Ubers and Bolts are very cheap and widely used to get around the city.
